Coming back, I was nervous that the friends I made during the mission trip were temporary. I was unsure whether the home I built with them in Kentucky would travel back to campus with us. Despite knowing my beliefs, I had multiple people, even the ones I did not connect as well with, heavily encouraged me to join Tuesday night worships with Campus Collective. And the rest is history. Joining a Christian Ministries club my freshman year of college is probably the last thing either myself or anyone who knows me would have expected. Yet here I am. I hardly miss a Tuesday worship night. I will admit, I do not attend to build a relationship with God. I still do not know where I am with that quite yet. #### **UW MADISON**

In a year of rebuilding and welcoming Josh Didier to our team as the new Lead Campus Minister at UW Madison we began handing out free cups of coffee to students and faculty on campus to make their day and help them to know someone saw them and cared about them. I still remember our fifth week when students began to recognize, "Hey, you guys are here every week." It was an exercise in trust building with students who are incredibly suspicious of Christian and faith-based groups, but over time trust and curiosity were built. Eventually students started to stop by saying, "I have seen you all year; I just had to see what this was all about." We tell students we do it to make their day. We tell them we are a campus ministry wanting to show them love and that we are with them in all the hard work they do week in and week out. By the end of the year, we had 30 students, staff, and faculty that had become our "regulars" we could talk with about their week and their life. One person we talked with at the end of the year said, "I am not an organized religious person, but I have a deep personal faith. I am grateful for you and how you show up each week to engage myself and campus. I am grateful that I can come out here and talk to you about anything, especially things I don't feel like I can talk to anyone else about. Over this year I have felt more connected to my faith and you guys have been a part of that." What we learned this year is that showing up every week matters to people. We learned that a



simple exchange of humanity and an earnest gift with no agenda outside of genuine presence can change a person's day, and maybe even their life. For some of the students we saw each week we wondered, "Were we the only people in their lives that knew what they were facing in life?" Maybe we were, maybe we were not, but we were there, and we cared, and it made a difference in students' lives.

This year God created a partnership with Campus Collective and En Vivo, a campus ministry of a similar ethos in Valencia,

Spain. Over Spring Break, we were able to take 15 students from Ripon College to experience faith in a new and international context. Of the 15 students we brought.

10 were students looking to reengage a faith that they had either walked away from or had allowed to go dormant over the course of the past few years. Because of this we prayed deeply for God to show up in the



lives of our students on this trip and He did! For many students God addressed fears that they had been carrying for far too long. For others they were deeply moved through experiencing God again in their lives on a different continent, blown away by God's faithfulness to His people across both time and cultures. We look forward to continuing to grow our relationship with En Vivo and seeing students' lives transformed as we share our faith from one continent to another!
